# Dear LNS families,

This past year we've all seen democracy in action at many levels. As a cooperative school, the principles of democratic participation for parents, teachers and children are at the core of our school culture. Do you remember participating in a board meeting, a committee meeting, a work day and parent helping? I would venture to say that these were democratic experiences and sometimes, the length



of a meeting (long) was a telltale sign that the democracy was working! The faculty also participates democratically as they collaborate with each other and with parents in the classroom. Our study of Reggio (a municipal system of infant-toddler centers and preschools in Reggio Emilia, Italy, which is world renowned for pioneering advancements in the field of early childhood) encourages us to think about how we create democracy in our classrooms.

The LNS environment respects and values each child, and is rich in the quantity and quality of relationships with children and adults. These elements provide a basis for democracy. Eliciting children's thoughts through conversation, listening to possibilities and offering a variety of ways for them to express their ideas offers children a way to make meaning of their world. Playing and working in small groups that share an interest gives children the opportunity to make discoveries at a deeper level. Our work is to give children their voice and make it visible to the community, and to celebrate

> the important role of parents in the classroom, as well as in the administration of LNS.

As you will see in our newsletter, our year has been filled with growing, learning and fun, and our hope is to stay connected to the important people in our past who have helped us create our future. Our alumni have played a key part in the democracy of Lincoln Nursery School and create continuity for our school. I invite and encourage you to stay in touch, and also to come visit. Whenever you decide to come you will be most welcome and you'll have a chance to reconnect with a community where the seeds of democracy come to life in our classrooms, and childhood explorations begin. ### Our new curriculum

**Our Expressive Arts Program at Play...** 

The Reggio approach to early childhood education engages children, teachers, parents and the community in a collaborative learning experience. For the past 2 years, the faculty has incorporated a Reggio approach into their teaching practice. It is an approach that gives voice to all children as individuals, and takes our curriculum in directions that really come from them. Sometimes it's hard to describe how it comes to life, so we thought an example might shine some more light on Reggio at play at LNS... On a fall morning, a nearly life-size cardboard

moose, was placed in the woods behind the nursery school by Yellow Class teachers Lauri Bounty and Alice Edwards, as a provocation for the children when they ventured out on their weekly nature walk. There was tremendous excitement when a child spotted a moose, causing the group to gather around the large cardboard animal with many questions and curiosities. The group decided to carry the moose back to school and then the children began to create the story of the moose, first by giving him a name, "Mitch," and then by incorporating him into their imagination and play. The teaching team recorded the children's conversations about Mitch and offered opportunities for children to extend their thinking. Where does Mitch live when he is not at LNS? What do moose eat? What happens when a moose gets sick? A few children thought that Mitch was bothered by mosquitoes, so they applied mosquito repellent sticker dots to help! It was determined that Mitch was magical and he came to life at night. In the weeks following, when the children arrived at school in the morning, Mitch had often changed his location, written a note or left some evidence that suggested he had been busy during the night. One night, Mitch left the school and WAS LOST! With the entire school in on the search, eventually he was found, thanks to persistent problem solving! The children's imagination created the magic of Mitch and infused the school with excitement. Our parents knew Mitch intimately and several designed Mitch T-shirts using a child's drawing to celebrate the day Mitch was found. The Mitch story culminated with a photograph of the entire school wearing Mitch t-shirts! Sadly, that night Mitch left the school to return to his family in the woods. In January, a full year later, Lauri received a postcard with a picture of a moose, posted in New Hampshire, indicating that Mitch lives on, at least in our hearts, and that's what matters most.

It's wonderful to see this philosophy come to life through our children at our school ... who knows where the children will lead us this year, but mostly likely it will be another wonderful adventure.

# Parent education focus Guiding our children through a world of media

With support from the LNS community, the Parent Education Committee is focusing its efforts this year on media education and the commercialization of childhood. Media consumption has become a very large part of our culture and our families' everyday lives. While there are some positive elements, parents and educators will benefit from a greater understanding of some of the harmful effects that both the content and delivery experience of media have on young children.



To encourage this year's discussion, we are facilitating a series of activities for the school. The 2008–2009 plan features a book discussion on media culture's effect on make-believe play and features materials to help parents better evaluate the impact of media on their family. Also, the school is sponsoring a public speaking event as part of its Parent Education Series. This year's speaker

will be Susan Linn. Susan is Associate Director of the Media Center at Judge Baker Children's Center at Harvard University and an instructor in psychiatry at Harvard Medical School. The talk is scheduled for March 18th (see below) and is open to the public. Our hope is to offer parents information on the media and encourage small changes that could have a positive influence on children and families.
